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the president

JOHN DULIEU - WARRIEWOOD SLSC PRESIDENT

Before we knew it, the 2023-2024 season was upon us once again, bringing a flurry of activity with the setup of Patrols, Training, Nippers, and the annual Cadet Camp at Port Stephens. Everything started as planned, much to the relief of all the people who invested so much time and energy in organizing these events.

Amidst the high-fiving over the successful launch of the new season, the Council, in October advised us that they were ready to hit the start button on the exterior refurbishments. While this was a great relief that work was finally getting started, it meant there was going to be some significant disruption to the way we had to operate for a few months. We got there in the end, and I think you will agree the refurbishments are a massive improvement. There is always something that throws a spanner in the works at the start of the season, but it didn't stop the Wazza spirit from flourishing, and we had another outstanding year.

Patrols

The core of what we do is ensuring the safety of the community at Warriewood Beach. I am pleased to advise that all visitors who enjoyed the sun and water activities at Warriewood returned home safely this year. It didn't go by without some outstanding rescues, one of which made headline news and was highly publicised throughout the season. I would like to thank and congratulate Saskia Trundle Trowbridge, Adam Kovac, and Martin Carlisle for their professionalism, not just for their heroics on the day of the rescue, but for the way each of you conducted yourselves in numerous media interviews.

Our 12 Patrol Teams dedicated over 6,650 volunteer hours keeping Warriewood Beach safe this year. I extend my gratitude to all the Patrolling Members, Patrol Captains, Vice Captains, and especially Mark O'Connell and Craig Perry for their invaluable leadership.

The success of our efforts on the beach is largely due to our members' commitment to maintaining and enhancing their skills. Maintaining our abilities is crucial to the tasks we perform on the beach. I want to express my sincere appreciation to those patrolling individuals who proactively improved their skills this year, as well as to those who successfully completed all their required proficiencies. Thank you for your dedication and hard work.

Education

The training team at Warriewood continues to thrive, and I firmly believe we have the best trainers and training group on the Northern Beaches. Our team now includes trainers and assessors across all awards: Bronze, SRC, Advanced Resuscitation, IRB, Gold Medallion,

First Aid, and Silver Medallion Beach Management. In addition we were delighted to welcome 2 new probationary trainers this year, Natasha Robertson-Hanning and Josephine Motte with Lilly Kovac assisting with training while waiting to complete the Training Officer Certificate course.

This year, we implemented a new approach to our Bronze Medallion Course, offering candidates the opportunity to attain their Bronze, ARTC, and First Aid Certificates concurrently. At one point, we were conducting five simultaneous training courses, which stretched our trainers to their limits in every aspect.

Our ART and IRB courses experienced unprecedented attendance this year, resulting in 14 IRB Crew, 6 IRB Driver, and 18 ART awards being issued.

The success in training and education this year would not have been possible without the direction and leadership of Tracey Hare-Boyd. I want to express my gratitude to Tracey for meticulously overseeing the processing of over 140 new awards and 550 proficiencies throughout the season.

A huge thank you also goes out to our trainers and assessors: Cam, Ange, James (2Dads), Neil (Dolly), Sascha, Trae, Rick, Adam, and Darren. Your unwavering dedication and commitment are crucial in ensuring our skills are maintained so our patrols can operate effectively on the beach.

Sponsorship

As a volunteer organisation, we seek to establish and maintain relationships with local organisations who have a shared passion for the local community and

the environment in which we live. Our sponsorship has maintained a steady pace over the last 12 months, and I would like to thank Dom Lynch for the outstanding effort in keeping this going for the club.

I extend a huge thank you to all our sponsors for their support throughout this year. Your generous contributions have significantly enhanced our club's ability to thrive and serve our community. Together, we are making a tangible difference in promoting safety on the beach and saving lives.

Of significance this year, I would like to thank Pittwater RSL for their contribution to the purchase of two new IRBs. Both IRBs are a welcome upgrade and have been named after two long-standing life members who have made significant contributions to IRB training over the years: Rick Harris and Neil 'Dolly' Dyer.

Fund Raising

The year started with Warriewood's fundraising activities having a great start, with the Cadets organizing a sausage sizzle at Bunnings Belrose. They raised over \$2000, it was wonderful to see them connect with the community and showcase their cooking skills. Well done to Adam Kovac and Elsie Andrews for getting this up and running again.

Unfortunately, we weren't as successful in raising funds through our Ocean Swim this year. Mother Nature reared its ugly head, and we had to cancel the event on two occasions, which was a great disappointment not only to the participants but also for our opportunity to connect with the community. A special thank you to Martin Carlisle for maintaining the energy in organizing this event twice this year.



There were various other fund raising events through the year, the BBQ after Nippers each Sunday – thank you Prisca and Nick, Sipper evenings – well done Michael Vanderlaan and the infamous annual Prawns and Peroni event held in February – thank you Andrea Powell.

Nippers

We were blessed this year with better weather and water conditions that enabled our Nippers to get in the water more often and extend their skills. At Warriewood, we focus on water skills for our Nippers, considering safety on our beaches one of our most important objectives for the Nippers program. This year, we have clearly seen great improvements in the water for many of our kids.

Although we don't have a strong focus on competitions, we had a good contingent of kids from all ages taking part in Carnivals. Caelan Drysdale confirmed his strength on the beach for flags and sprints at the State level, with many other personal bests achieved and individual challenges met.

After three years of dedicated commitment, Neal McCarry stood down as Nippers President and handed over the reins to Valerio Corniani. Neal, we salute you for your commitment and passion over the last 3 years, we thank you for the numerous smiles that have been generated throughout the course of the Nipper program under your leadership.

I would also like to extend a huge thanks to the Nippers Committee, Age Managers, our water safety and to Prisca and the team who man the BBQ each and every weekend.

Surf Sports

The Sand Dancers had yet another exceptional year, becoming Aussie champs once again in the Master Sprint Relay. That makes it the 9th victory for our Sand Dancers. This achievement doesn't happen by chance, every Sunday, we witness Adam Gee, Ben Hargy, Glen Bauder, Chris Macdonald, and Iain Archer training hard on the beach.

There were also outstanding individual performances. Adam Gee won Gold in his age category, and Ben Hargy secured Bronze in the flags event. It was a delight to see



impressive performances from the younger generation as well, with young Caelan Drysdale winning Silver in the Flags at the state level.

I also want to commend the Masters team for their positive influence on the younger generation. Every Sunday morning before Nippers, our Sand Dancers generously share their skills and knowledge with our Nippers. They are absolute legends

Dippers

For me, the standout this year was the partnership forged with Autism Swim to support the Dippers program. This was something I had wanted to do for some time – support areas of the community that are less fortunate than ourselves when it comes to enjoying what we take for granted, such as having a nice relaxing day down at the beach.

I knew this was going to be a tall order, asking our volunteers to go the extra mile and commit more hours on the beach than we already do. The turnout we had in volunteers was truly amazing, with just under 40 water safety members making themselves available to support this community initiative. A big thank you to Neal McCarry and Sascha Rundle for managing this program, the feedback from participants and parents was truly overwhelming and it still brings a tear to my eye when reading the feedback from

parents. Well done Wazza, you stood out from the crowd once again.

Club Administration, Governance & Finance

Governance across Surf Life Saving increases each year, requiring more work and diligence from an administrative perspective. In some instances the tasks can be overwhelming. We are very fortunate to have the likes of Peter Casey, our Club Treasurer; Libby Vanderlaan, Club Registrar; Melinda O'Connell, Club Secretary; and our Office Admin, Dominique Bennet looking after the administration side of the club. I am glad to report that Warriewood was compliant in every facet for the 2023/24 season.

With the cost of living pressures also affecting our club, cost management this year has also been a big focus. A number of initiatives have already been implemented and are underway to reduce costs. Some areas include installing an electrical meter to itemize café usage, switching to new gas providers, and updating employment contracts. As the end of the financial year to April 30, 2024, Warriewood SLSC reported a profit of \$65,359

Of significance this year was the signing of a 20-year lease with Sydney Northern Beaches Council. This provides the club with more certainty and clarity regarding the usage of club facilities, enabling us to plan for the





future. I would like to thank Tracey Hare-Boyd in her capacity as Branch President and CEO for coordinating this with the Council, and Peter Kinsey (Long Reef President) for his legal advice. It was a long journey to get this signed, and we couldn't have done it without your assistance.

I would like to express my gratitude and appreciation to the dedicated individuals on our committee who have made significant contributions throughout the year. Specifically, I want to thank Cameron Powell – Club Vice President, Peter Casey – Club Treasurer, Mark O'Connell - Club Captain, Craig Perry – Vice Club Captain, Mel O'Connell - Club Secretary, Tracey Hare-Boyd- Chief Training Officer, Adam Kovac, - Youth Development Officer, Neal McCarry - Nippers President, and Libby Vanderlaan - Club Registrar. Often, the effort each of you has invested goes unnoticed, and I want to take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank you for your time, dedication, and professionalism demonstrated throughout this season.

From a Life Saving Operational perspective, the 23/24 season for Warriewood was for the most part, without incident. Whilst we look back on our season this may not make for interesting reading in this space, I see it more as an acknowledgment to every one of our patrolling members, as an outstanding commitment to keeping those who visited Warriewood this year safe.

The events that unfolded on the afternoon of Sunday the 21st January have been well documented. While writing this, I have again watched the news footage showing Saskia Rundle-Trowbridge and Adam Kovac, with the assistance of Mark Booney and Jacob Rodwell from Mona Vale, extract 3 young boys from the entrance to the cave leading to the blowhole we know so well.

irb report

DEAN HINDMAN - IRB CAPTAIN

At the end of our 2023/2024 season, one of the highlights for me was most definitely the unveiling of our two new Thundercat boats in the names of our still active members, Neil 'Dolly' Dyer and Rick Harris. Our IRB's provide a very crucial element to our service, and we are excited to be retiring 515N & 506N thanks to the ongoing support of Pittwater RSL for our total IRB programme.

Again, thanks to this sponsorship, we will also be retiring our two oldest engines and replacing them with 2 new Tohatsu Engines that plan to be run in for the start of next season, in parallel with the launch of the two inflatables.

I'd like to thank everyone within the club for their ongoing support and help to keep these boats and engines rescue ready. Every Warriewood patrol checks, operates, cleans and leaves our boats and engines ready for an after hours event, or operation the following day, and there is great communication if there are any issues to be rectified. I am very proud of our club's respect and approach to this equipment, which ensures we continue to have some of the best and well kept rescue gear in the branch.

We continued to run new crew and driver training throughout the year, and have also had members participate again at the advanced driving/crewing 'Albert' course. The skills, timing and risk management in these roles are some of the best available in the club, and I encourage as many people as possible to train and support their patrol in these roles, particularly with our Blowhole cover.

Finally, to extend on the Blowhole, as part of our skills proficiency next season, we will be incorporating Blowhole and Keyhole training, so as to help provide confidence and experience in these locations to all drivers and crew.

Our 2 Inflatable Rescue Boats (IRB) and 4 Engines have provided year round patrol support and I want to thank each patrol for cleaning, washing and leaving the equipment rescue ready for the next patrol. Without doubt, a big thanks goes out to Rick, Dolly, Milly & Cam, who continue to provide invaluable support to keep the equipment in what I would say is amongst the best on the beaches.

Thanks to our Pittwater RSL IRB sponsorship, we have purchased 2 more Tohatsu motors this year as planned, meaning our entire fleet is now Tohatsu, keeping things simple and consistent. There is a new whiteboard above the engine rack, for a quick summary of engine status and any key issues/notes for



patrols. We have installed a fuel cabinet to hold the bladders in shelves that significantly improves ease of use and storage, and we eagerly await the replacement of the 2 inflatable boats which we are hoping to receive towards the end of the next season. We have also just installed a new hose-plug style wash system that means we don't have to fill up the buckets after each wash down, now just once or twice a year (so don't throw out the bucket).

Warriewood was proud to be a host of the Albert Program on the Northern Beaches which is a must for all our drivers and crew. Making a rescue when it counts is often much more than just knowing how to drive. The course focuses on communicating and working as a team when under pressure, for mass rescues, search and rockwork, providing one of the best learning experiences SLSC has to offer - don't miss out on next seasons course, I know a number of people who have done it twice because they enjoyed it so much.

Early in the season, or even before we start, we will have installed 'springs' that return the throttle automatically to idle if you accidentally let go of the throttle, a great safety add to the Tohatsu engines that has been tested over the past 12 months,

and we are looking forward to this being implemented. Our last driver and crew course also recorded their IRB rollover procedures and we created a simple and easy to view video that you can all review prior to proficiency, or at any time just to refresh - just scan the QR code on the whiteboard above the motors in the shed.

I would finally like to encourage all of you to get involved in crewing and/or driving, it is incredibly safe when done right, teaches brilliant communication and teamwork skills, and is a very important part of our ability to save lives. The Albert course has really been passing on learnings to improve safety tenfold, teaching drivers and crew how to reduce injury, and be more effective. We know that the more you drive in varying conditions, the safer and more capable the rescue. For 2023, our goal is for every driver and crew to be comfortable and feel safer, in bigger surf conditions. Thanks for a great 2022/3 Warriewood.

education & training

TRACEY HARE-BOYD - CHIEF TRAINING OFFICER

There were a few changes within the delivery of training at Warriewood across the 2023/24 season.

The ability to provide in-house training of First Aid, the opportunity to train Facilitator delivered courses and having Facilitators within Warriewood, enabled the Club to streamline and change the scope and delivery of courses within the Club.

With the change in delivery, Warriewood Trainers, Assessors, Facilitators (TAFs), were able to train several courses at the one time with the result of a new Bronze candidate finishing up with 3 qualifications not just their Bronze. This season, a new Bronze candidate completed their training by achieving awards of First Aid, Bronze and ART.

At one stage, Warriewood TAFs were training 5 courses consecutively to their members, which is a great effort by both TAF and Member.

Working within all portfolios, training and education is the foundation of any Club. However, training cannot occur without the hard-working team of dedicated Warriewood TAFs.

Our trainers and assessors continued to expand their skills this year with Cameron Powell becoming an RWC Facilitator, Tracey Hare-Boyd becoming a UAV Training Officer, Trae Hare-Boyd becoming an IRB Trainer, and proudly, we had the addition of 2 Probationary Training Officers in Natasha Robertson-Hanning and Josephine Motte with Lilly Kovac assisting with training while waiting to complete the Training Officer Certificate course.

On a yearly basis, our TAFs complete a professional development session and re-endorsement process as well as being proficient for every award that they are a TAF for. That means a skills maintenance along with professional development for each award which, in itself, is a huge commitment of time over and above a training and skills maintenance schedule that our TAFs are providing at a Club level. On average, training an SRC or Bronze course can take up to 40 hours of training each, an ART course up to 12 hours and IRB Driver and Crew each can take up to 14 hours as each and this doesn't include any preparation or admin time spent in the background, additional training and attendance at assessments.

Given this huge commitment, I would like to extend a sincere Thank You to all the Warriewood Trainers, Assessors and Facilitators, for the time they dedicate to the members through training and skills maintenance. Warriewood Training team is also assisted by some very knowledgeable



subject matter experts who consistently attend and assist with water safety, skills refinement. While not TAFs, subject matter experts are always welcome for their assistance and sharing of knowledge and for this, I would also like to say a sincere Thank You.

Surf Rescue Certificate

The 2023-24 season again saw Adam Kovac taking the role of lead Trainer for the SRC group assisted by Natasha and Josephine as Probationary Training Officers and Lilly as a subject matter expert.

Warriewood sent 21 13-year-olds to Newport to attend an SRC assessment. On that same afternoon, 21 13-year-olds returned to Warriewood as Surf Rescue Certificate holders, tired but excited, ready and keen to be allocated to their patrols.

All candidates have since received their uniforms and have proudly patrolled Warriewood beach over the remainder of the season. One proud moment for this cohort is being presented with their uniforms during the Sunday morning Nipper muster and then providing water safety for the very proud group that most have come through from the age of 5.

Having sat in and assisted with some training sessions, I note the maturity of this group and look forward to seeing them develop and become Bronze qualified members of Warriewood.

I also want to note and congratulate the Warriewood representatives for the SNB Junior Lifesaver of the Year program in Chloe Motte and Finn Drysdale. 2 amazing ambassadors and representatives for Warriewood.

SRC to Bronze Transition

This transition course was introduced to Warriewood cadets last season and this year, we added to the complexity of it by getting the candidates to complete their First Aid course and Advanced Resuscitation course.

Congratulations to the 15 transition candidates achieved 3 awards being First Aid, Bronze Medallion and ART by the time they would normally have only completed and achieved their Bronze.

Of special note, these members all completed their SRC 2 seasons ago at the tender age of 13 and its pleasing to see these members continue to patrol over the 2 seasons and achieve their Bronze.

Bronze Medallion

The traditional Bronze course format also changed with the addition of First Aid training being delivered at the beginning of the course and then focusing on water skills and the inclusion of ART into the dry training. These new to Bronze also finished their training journey being awarded, First Aid, Bronze and ART all within the same time they would have taken to complete a normal individual Bronze. Although the numbers were low at 6 new full Bronze members, the 6 were keen and wouldn't accept the sometimes harsh conditions that Warriewood beach can deliver and trained their hearts out.

Traditionally the number of Bronze would have been bolstered with the addition of the SRC to Bronze transition candidates however, they have been separated for this report. As we head into the upcoming season, we will ensure we are working on attracting more new members to complete their Bronze, so, if you are a Nipper parent, start training!

education & training

Advance Resuscitation Techniques (ART)

With the upgrade from ARTC and ART (AID) going on in the background, Warriewood added 18 new Advanced Resuscitation Techniques award holders to their patrols this season.

Thanks to John Dulieu, Cameron Powell, Trae Hare-Boyd, James Leggett-Budden and Tracey Hare-Boyd for assisting with the successful training and upskilling of these candidates. It is a requirement that each patrol has an ART award holder on the beach in order to raise the flags so it is a vital part of our life saving skills training.

IRB

It was a successful season for the Warriewood IRB training team with 21 members achieving these extra awards.

Thank you to Cameron Powell, Neil Dyer and John Dulieu for running these courses, and to Rick Harris for his assessing efforts across the Branch and subject matter expert Dean Hindman who doubles up as the Warriewood IRB Captain.

IRB Crew

Congratulations to the 14 candidates who were awarded with the IRB Crew award this season.

Silver Medallion IRB Driver

Always in short supply are IRB Driver's. This season we congratulate and welcomed 6 new SM IRB Drivers to patrols.

As we move into the 2024-25 season, we will again concentrate on increasing our IRB Driver numbers on patrol.

First Aid

An amazing effort for 30 Warriewood members achieving their First Aid certificate this season. Some members used this as their pre-requisite for other awards and some members were renewing their expired award. Another huge effort by the Warriewood training team.

Silver Medallion Patrol Captain

Warriewood also increased their Patrol Captain numbers by 8 this season with 7 new to the award and 1 upskilling to the new award.

Gold Medallion

Considered as the pinnacle of all medallions, Warriewood saw 1 new award recipient and several holders completing proficiency for the season.

Rescue Water Craft

A lot of training goes into achieving this award. Warriewood had 2 candidates participating in the training with 1 candidate being assessed and awarded their RWC



qualification and another waiting on an assessment date with the correct conditions in which the assessment can be conducted.

ALBERT

Warriewood hosted the 2023 ALBERT (Australian Lifesaving Boat Emergency Rescue Training) course and in 2024, 6 Warriewood members attended Whale Beach over a very wet and cold weekend to further enhance their IRB skills through the ALBERT course.

Not only was it a wet and cold weekend, but it was also a weekend with predicted big swell and the Surf Gods certainly delivered with some huge swell which made the training all the more interesting.

A great time was had by all Warriewood members and this course continues to get some very good feedback and while the

feedback was still good, 1 member did end up having some surgery on his foot to remove about 20 sea urchin spines which he stood on when doing some rock rescue work and a large wave washed some of the candidates across the rock platform.

Skills Maintenance

Working with the Club Captain, an introductory meeting was held pre-season TAFs and Patrol Captains. At this meeting our TAFs and PC's completed their dry component of skills maintenance while participating in an update of what the season ahead for skills maintenance would look like. Thank You to the PC's and TAFs who attended this session, it made putting a plan together for patrol skills maintenance a lot easier. Another massive effort this season to get through all the dry and wet components of skills maintenance across the patrolling members at Warriewood. All except 34

members completed their skills maintenance. Thank You not only to the TAFs, Patrol Captains but also the members who took the time to complete their annual skills maintenance session across all awards.

Skills maintenance is usually a dreaded activity, but the satisfaction of completing your eLearning, run/swim/run and rescue is second to none. It's vital we ensure our skills are up-to-date, practiced and consistent, not only our land based but water skills as well.

Managing this extensive logistical operation is an annual challenge that requires TAFs, Patrol Captains and delegates to dedicate a considerable amount of time, not only conducting the sessions but also meticulously documenting and entering, every aspect of each proficiency activity and session including chasing up eLearning components that need to be done...again, Thank You.

Surf Sports Official

Not to be left out, Warriewood had 1 recipient complete their Core Officials award to ensure that attendance Warriewood was fulfilling their official quota at Junior carnivals.

Supporting the Branch and Other Clubs As Warriewood continues to grow, the Club is fortunate that the training team is increasing. With Central Venue Assessment's being run throughout the Branch, Warriewood is always well represented at every CVA whether by Trainer, Assessor or Facilitator. Warriewood TAFs also assist other Clubs in the Branch with training requirements and resources, assessing, delivery of facilitated courses, skills maintenance and even visiting other Branches to assist with the facilitation and assessment of specific courses.

Thank You John Dulieu, Cameron Powell, Rick Harris and Tracey Hare-Boyd for their assistance in supporting the Branch in training, assessing and facilitation across a number of awards including Bronze, SRC, Advanced Resuscitation, IRB Crew, IRB Driver Gold Medallion and Silver Medallion Patrol Captain. All four individuals also contribute a significant amount of their time mentoring others from a variety of Clubs in training and assessing across the Northern Beaches.

In Summary

We have had another successful season of Training and Education. This is largely due to the efforts and quality of our TAFs. We continue to provide a high standard of education at Warriewood which shows on the beach during patrols.

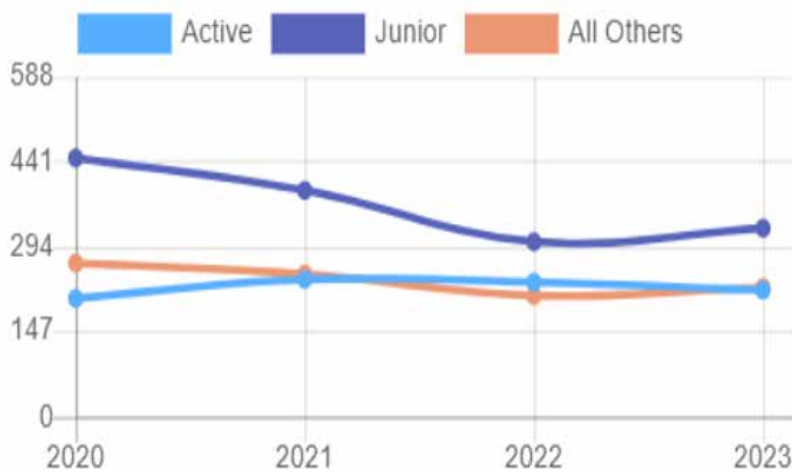

Dippers is a modified nippers and surf education program for people with disability. Warriewood SLSC partnered with Autism Swim to run a pilot season from January to March 2024. This was the first time the program had been run on Sydney's northern beaches.

Each Sunday, Warriewood's Dippers participants joined volunteers to enjoy a range of fun sand and water-based activities led by our amazing Dippers Leader Cathy Milliken. A trained clinician attended every session, thanks to financial support provided by local community group Soroptimist International Northern Beaches.

The ages of the Dippers participants ranged from 7 to 27. The activities were tailored specifically to each participant's needs with individual goals set such as increasing their surf awareness, confidence in the water and ability to work as a team.

Each Dippers participant was warmly supported by a large and diverse group of volunteers, all of whom were proficient in either SRC or Bronze Medallion.

The volunteers made the program an outstanding success. Their encouragement, friendship, patience and overwhelming positivity was incredibly powerful. A big thanks to the nearly 40 people from Warriewood, Newport and Long Reef SLSCs who gave up



their time and energy to help support our Dippers.

Autism Swim estimates that people with autism face a risk of drowning which is 140 times that experienced by community members who are neurotypical. The Dippers program was our chance to turn around those statistics and help our community.

The Dippers program was not the only Warriewood SLSC activity to send a strong message of inclusion. Around the time of

International Women's Day, Warriewood members held a sippers event which paid tribute to the women and girls in our club community. The clubhouse bar served special pink drinks as club members celebrated Warriewood women by wearing pink outfits.

Notes of the Financial Statements

Warriewood Surf Life Saving Club Inc. ABN 95 461 578 195

For the year ended 30 April 2024

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements cover Warriewood Surf Lifesaving Club as an individual entity. Warriewood Surf Life Saving Club Inc. ABN 95 461 578 195 is a not-for-profit Association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW).

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth), the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the club's constitution. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements

AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows

AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

AASB 124 Related Party Disclosures

AASB 1031 Materiality

AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards

AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment(excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

Financial Instruments

Recognition, initial measurement and derecognition

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument, and are measured initially at fair value adjusted by transactions costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities are described below.

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the financial asset and all substantial risks and rewards are transferred. A financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets

Except for those trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component and are measured at the transaction price, all financial assets are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs (where applicable).

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets other than those designated and effective as hedging instruments are classified into the following categories upon initial recognition:

- amortised cost
- fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)
- equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables which is presented within other expenses.

Classifications are determined by both:

- The entities business model for managing the financial asset
- The contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables, which is presented within other expenses.

Subsequent measurement financial assets

Financial assets at amortised cost

Financial assets are measured at amortised cost if the assets meet the following conditions (and are not designated as FVPL):

- they are held within a business model whose objective is to hold the financial assets and collect its contractual cash flows
- the contractual terms of the financial assets give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding

After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial. The Association's cash and cash equivalents, trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments as well as long-term deposit that were previously classified as held-to-maturity under AASB 139.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)

Financial assets that are held within a different business model other than 'hold to collect' or 'hold to collect and sell' are categorised at fair value through profit and loss. Further, irrespective of business model financial assets whose contractual cash flows are not solely payments of principal and interest are accounted for at FVPL. All derivative financial instruments fall into this category, except for those designated and effective as hedging instruments, for which the hedge accounting requirements apply (see below).

Equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (Equity FVOCI)

Investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading are eligible for an irrevocable election at inception to be measured at FVOCI. Under Equity FVOCI, subsequent movements in fair value are recognised in other comprehensive income and are never reclassified to profit or loss. Dividend from these investments continue to be recorded as other income within the profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents return of capital.

Impairment of Financial assets

AASB 9's impairment requirements use more forward looking information to recognize expected credit losses - the 'expected credit losses (ECL) model'. Instruments within the scope of the new requirements included loans and other debt-type financial assets measured at amortised cost and FVOCI, trade receivables and loan commitments and some financial guarantee contracts (for the issuer) that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Association considers a broader range of information when assessing credit risk and measuring expected credit losses, including past events, current conditions, reasonable and supportable forecasts that affect the expected collectability of the future cash flows of the instrument.

In applying this forward-looking approach, a distinction is made between:

- financial instruments that have not deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition or that have low credit risk ('Stage 1') and
- financial instruments that have deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition and whose credit risk is not low ('Stage 2').

'Stage 3' would cover financial assets that have objective evidence of impairment at the reporting date.

'12-month expected credit losses' are recognised for the first category while 'lifetime expected credit losses' are recognised for the second category.

Measurement of the expected credit losses is determined by a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of the financial instrument.

Trade and other receivables

The Association makes use of a simplified approach in accounting for trade and other receivables and records the loss allowance at the amount equal to the expected lifetime credit losses. In using this practical expedient, the Association uses its historical experience, external indicators and forward-looking information to calculate the expected credit losses using a provision matrix.

Classification and measurement of financial liabilities

As the accounting for financial liabilities remains largely unchanged from AASB 139, the Association's financial liabilities were not impacted by the adoption of AASB 9. However, for completeness, the accounting policy is disclosed below.

The Association's financial liabilities include borrowings and trade and other payables.

Financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value, and, where applicable, adjusted for transaction costs unless the Association designated a financial liability at fair value through profit or loss.

Subsequently, financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method except for derivatives and financial liabilities designated at FVPL, which are carried subsequently at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss (other than derivative financial instruments that are designated and effective as hedging instruments).

All interest-related charges and, if applicable, changes in an instrument's fair value that are reported in profit or loss are included within finance costs or finance income.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.

Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

Significant management judgement in applying accounting policies

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgements, estimates and assumptions about the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses.

Estimation uncertainty

Information about estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses is provided below. Actual results may be substantially different.

Impairment

In assessing impairment, management estimates the recoverable amount of each asset or cash-generating units, based on expected future cash flows and uses an interest rate to discount them. Estimation uncertainty relates to assumptions about future operating results and the determination of a suitable discount rate.

Useful lives of depreciable assets

Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical obsolescence that may change the utility of certain software and IT equipment.

Inventories

Management estimates the net realisable values of inventories, taking into account the most reliable evidence available at each reporting date. The future realisation of these inventories may be affected by future technology or other market-driven changes that may reduce future selling prices.

Long service leave

The liability for long service leave is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

Related Party Transactions

The Association's related parties include its key management personnel and related entities as described below. Unless otherwise stated, none of the transactions incorporate special terms and conditions and no guarantees were given or received. Outstanding balances are usually settled in cash.

Transactions with related entities

During the current year, the Association purchased clothing from Catfish Athlete Apparel which is partly owned by a person who is an extended family relative of a member of the Executive Committee. The Committee member recused himself from decisions regarding clothing purchases, and transactions were completed at arm's length value. The total value of purchases amounted to \$8,166 (2023: \$5,435)

Transactions with key management personnel

Key management personnel and volunteers are not compensated for holding office positions, nor for any other activity related to the Club.



Masters Beach Team Report

Medals at Mooloolaba

In 2024 the beach events of the Australian Surf Lifesaving Championships returned to Mooloolaba on the Sunshine Coast of Queensland. The custom-built track, constructed underneath the surf clubs' terraced levels is a favourite on the tour. This site was the first to run the "Final under lights" format which creates an intense atmosphere and hordes of vocal spectators. The Warriewood Sandmen have had a good run at this venue winning the Relay on both visits of 2016 and 21.

The WW form guide was positive after the State Titles at Queenscliff with Ben Hargy and Chris MacDonald going one-two in the 45's, Adam Gee a shaky Silver in 50's behind North Bondi and Glen Bauder 6th in 55's- on the improve with a new training program. This was a first NSW win for Beno and 2nd was a great motivator for the historically dominant Gee. A Gold in the 200's Relay with Iain Archer rotating in fresh to join Bauder, Gee and Hargy. A hot team from Manly with three former Aussie Champs were set to challenge but withdrew due to injury.

The team of Bauder, Hargy, MacDonald and Gee made their way to the Sunshine Coast in April and on arrival the beach strip was inundated with club colours, a sign of a bumper entry list. It was likely that our age groups were to have three grids individually with a semi and final in the relay added for a "Five Run Monday". This is

prepared for in training, but the pressure of expectation and a big crowd can bring the fittest master undone with some unlucky punters tearing ligaments in their first run of the Championships. Through the heats our Sandmen walked that balance of running hard enough to be near the front to guarantee transfer, without burning up too much of the gas that will be needed in the finals.

With big fields the sun was well and truly down by finals time which ran oldest first. Flood lights were blaring, and retro rock echoed along the track between races.

Individual Finals

Glenn was first away and looking powerful out of the blocks taking him to a career high of Fourth in the 55's. Then Adam executed one of his best wins under pressure to forge ahead of his NSW foe Maybury and claim an amazing 5th Aussie individual Gold. Macca flipped the ledger to be 0.13 seconds in front of Beno for Silver and Bronze in Australia behind Dutton, a Mooloolaba local.

Relays

With the Manly superstars falling foul to hamstring failure but Warriewoods' four fighting fit, Relay predictions were hastily calculated based on "who from where" finished in the medals. This showed the home club being the highest rank challengers with two individual Golds', and risk mitigation strategies were put in place of a "smart semi-final" of easy changes and less than peak speeds. WW did draw Mooloolaba in the semi who lit the afterburners for the win, whilst we

stuck to the game plan and came in a safe 3rd behind Queenscliff.

Partners on the sidelines added extra gravity this year and in the final Bauder was with tough company off the start as expected with the home team and South Curl Curl clear out in front. Hargy entered the overtaking lane on the second leg with MacDonald eclipsing Mooloolaba's third sprinter on transit. Once Gee collected the baton in 1st, no one was going to reel in the World Champ who just had to stay upright to secure a 9th Aussie Relay Gold for Warriewood SLSC in the modern era. Good times.

Flags

On day two Hargy fronted up to the flags having covered nearly every top ten Australian spot in recent years, a medal still elusive. The 45's ended up in South pit-straight under the club, spectators rowdy as many had already started the Masters after party. Things were not looking good when Beno was forced to have a runoff with a Queenslander after a locked flag in 12th, but that was survived and one by one the field shrunk as the bumping, shoving and diving became more frenzied. Ironically the NSW champ from Beno's hometown of Port Macquarie was the man to exit in 4th, guaranteeing a Warriewood Medal. A locked flag when diving for Silver, meant another run off- but the Surfers Paradise competitor prevailed. A bronze resulting in medals in all three beach disciplines for Hargy, a fortunate carnival.

World Championship Preparations

All five regular runners have declared intention to compete at Worlds in August 2024 at lifesavings' spiritual home on the Gold Coast. Two consecutive Golds have been won by Adam individually and by the Relay Team in Adelaide 2018 and Italy 2022 (Also, a bronze by Chris). Worlds teams are three runners, so the search for a sixth began to enable a second team.

Good news is training has resumed and a well-known identity from a local club has joined in. It is likely the Sandmen will field 150- and 170-years teams, doubling the chance of three Golds in a row. This will in no way be easy, with Kurrawa QLD likely to draw the best teams ever assembled from across the world. Clubs from places such as the USA, South Africa and Spain have already entered.

Three months of heavy preparation coming up, bring it on
